Admission Requirements	<p>If transferring with at least 24 college-level courses, a 2.0 cum GPA from all colleges attended is required.</p> <p>If 24 graded, transferable semester credits haven't been completed, students must meet admission requirements for students entering directly from high school in addition to having a 2.0 cum GPA from all colleges attended. High school admission requirements can be found at: www.admissions.iastate.edu/freshman/requirements.php</p> <p>Note that some programs may require a transfer GPA higher than 2.00.</p>	<p>College of Liberal Arts & Sciences:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • A 2.50 cumulative GPA on at least 24 semester hours (36 quarter hours) of acceptable graded credit. • Completed High School Course Req (www.uiowa.edu/admissions/undergrad/requirements/fy-clas-hsreqs.htm) OR • An AA degree from an Iowa community college or Waldorf College and a cum transfer GPA of at least 2.00 from all colleges attended. AA holders from Black Hawk College in Illinois must have a cumulative transfer GPA of 2.25 from all colleges attended. 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Foreign Language Requirements	<p>College of Liberal Arts & Sciences: Students with less than 24 credits should have completed 2 years in a single language in high school for admission. Course Repeat Policy	<p>A course may be repeated at a college other than the one at which it was originally taken, provided Iowa State sees the second course as an equivalent. Only the higher grade will be used in calculating the transfer GPA. If the course is completed at Iowa State, the repeat must also be taken at Iowa State.</p>	<p>If you repeat a course at the same institution, or an approved equivalent course from another transfer college, the first grade is not counted in your cumulative transfer GPA. If the course is completed at The University of Iowa, the repeat must also be taken at The University of Iowa.</p>	<p>A course may be repeated at a college other than the one at which it was originally taken, provided UNI sees the second course as an equivalent. This includes courses originally taken at UNI. The most recent grade is taken.</p> <p>Courses may not be repeated using a Credit/No Credit option.</p>

Maximum Number of Transfer Credits Accepted	65 credits from all 2-year colleges attended. No limit from 4 year colleges, however, the last 32 hours must be earned at Iowa State.	Course work earned at a 2-year college may apply up to 1/2 the credits required for a bachelor's degree (120 in the College of Liberal Arts & Sciences). The excess credit & grades will be used in computing the GPA & may be used to satisfy course requirements, but they will not count toward the total hours needed for graduation from the University. No limit from 4 year colleges, however student must meet on campus residency requirements & major requirements.	65 credits from 2-year colleges. No limit from 4 year colleges, however, 32 hours must be earned at UNI for graduation.
Vocational-Technical Credits	Up to 16 semester credits will transfer. It is typically used for general elective credit. Since voc-tech credit transfers as ungraded credit, it does not count toward the 24 transferable hours needed for admission.	Up to 16 semester hours can be used as elective credit toward a degree in the Colleges of Liberal Arts & Sciences, Education, or Business. Vocational-technical credit, however, comes in as ungraded credit and does not count toward the 24 transferable hours needed for admission.	16 credits maximum in non-industrial technology majors. Up to 48 in industrial tech majors. A number of articulation agreements exist in this area. AA Degree Articulation Agreement	The AA degree transfers and meets general education requirements for students in the College of Liberal Arts and Sciences. Foreign language requirements and diversity requirements are not satisfied with the AA degree.	<p>Transfer students with an AA degree from an Iowa Community College are exempt from the High School Course Requirements. In addition, these students will enter the University having fulfilled all of the General Education Program requirements (except foreign language) for the College of Liberal Arts and Sciences and the College of Education.</p> <p>The Tippie College of Business accepts AA degrees to fulfill all General Education Program requirements except global and cultural studies.</p>	<p>The AA degree transfers and satisfies Liberal Arts Core for all students in all majors, with the exception of the Non-Western Culture requirement which can be completed at the community college, and Capstone which must be taken at UNI.</p> <p>Out-of-state AA degrees are evaluated on a course by course basis.</p>
